## Message from the President

Well, here we are again – school association AGM time of year (for the majority of them)!!

Now take a deep breath!! There is no need to panic. Just slow down, read through your constitution, Secretary's Instructions #7 and Minister's instructions #12, it lays it all out. If this is not helping just pick up the phone or send us an email and we can provide the support you need to move this process forward. We can provide you with supporting resources to help you deliver the perfect AGM! TASSO offer a range of templates to help to make your AGM a seamless meeting. Some of the supports we can offer include:

- Step by Step breakdown of what is required to hold an AGM
- Template of a nomination form for potential committee members
- Template of an agenda to run an AGM including each person's role in running the AGM
   This agenda provides all the details of what must be passed through motions, etc
- Supporting documents that outline the role and responsibility of Office Bearers on the committee

In addition, we have a wonderful staff and a quality board who are also available to answer any and all of your questions and support you to deliver not only a quality AGM but committee meetings throughout the year! In relation to AGMs, many phone calls we receive are about the filling of positions or the lack of being able to fill positions......... I am here to say "this is okay"- on the back page of your constitution it will advise you what is the minimum and maximum number required to form a committee. Whilst each constitution is slightly different most adopted the numbers from the model constitution which is a maximum of 11 and a minimum of 5.

Your Principal is automatically one, 2 staff and we are already over half-way there! Whilst it is ideal to fill all spots at the AGM the reality for many of us in our communities is this is difficult and that is okay! Any position not filled at the AGM can be filled through the course of the year by nomination at one of your committee meetings.

So as a committee, it is okay to give yourself the time to approach parents in the school community and discuss coming on to the committee over time – invite them to a committee meeting as an observer so they can get an understanding of what is involved, talk to parents who are involved as volunteers in the school and canvas their interest.

Now you have held a successful AGM! What's next?"

Generally, straight after the AGM we rush straight into our first committee meeting of the year and straight on to the agenda and business items of the previous committee. At this point I would like to ask a couple of questions –

"How is this inclusive to new members of your committee? Answer – It isn't!

"How does it allow them to make informed and educated decisions on behalf of the community they represent? Answer – It doesn't!

I would strongly suggest the meeting straight after your AGM be the election of your office bearer positions and then a proper Induction and planning meeting. Provide at that meeting the previous 12 months minutes, copies of policies, the school improvement plan and any information that is going to help them be an informed member of your committee. It is also a good review for those who have been on the committee previously and brings you all to the same start point to move forward for the year.

In terms of planning – locking in all the dates for meetings, events both those run by school association and those run by the school which may require parent support – sports carnivals, major assemblies etc

This gives you as a committee and the parents in your community time to plan how they can support these events.

Once again TASSO can offer a suite of supporting documents and well as dedicated board members to help you run this meeting. Simply contact the TASSO office for advice and support.

Finally, Tasso is running a series of Q&A evening and Regional Forums over the next 12 months to help support our school associations committee and specifically the Office Bearers in there positions and roles.

This is a massive achievement, with CHS taking out the win for the first time since 2009! We couldn't be more proud of the resilience, participation and determination shown by all of our students.






#### St Helens District High School (official)

Home readers are a familiar concept when it comes to children learning to read at home but few of them are anything like these.

Millie the Mathematician and Suzie the Scientist are home readers with a twist. As the titles suggest, the topics of the readers are maths and science. Hidden within the text of the readers, these topics are intertwined with the story.

All Tasmanian state schools and colleges have a school association. Membership of the association includes all parents/carers of enrolled students, school staff (teaching and non-teaching) and members of the school community.

The aim of the school association is to provide an avenue for everyone to support students by supporting the school. Decades of research recognises that when families, schools and communities work in genuine collaboration and positive engagement with one and other, student learning and wellbeing improves.

#### **School Association Committee**

Consists of the principal and elected representatives from parents/carers, school staff and community members. The election of representatives occurs in the lead up to and possibly at the school association's Annual General Meeting (AGM), which for most schools and colleges will be occurring in the coming weeks.

The best way to find out more information about your school association is to ask your school and other parents/carers, talk with a school association committee member and or attend the AGM or a committee meeting.

#### Do I have to be a member of the school association committee to contribute?

You do not have to be on the School Association Committee to make a valuable contribution to the school your children attend. Members of the Committee will be able to tell you of about ways you can contribute and be engaged in not only your child's education but in that of others as well.


Until then, we have the following resources to help pave the way for your successful meeting!

Regardless of when in 2020 your Association's AGM was held if your Constitution states that it is to be held around March  $31 \rm st$ , then it  $\frac{\rm must}{\rm must}$  be held on or around March  $31 \rm st$ , 2021. How is your School Association Committee tracking in preparation for the upcoming AGM, have you...

- Set a date, time & venue (remember social distancing)?
- Called for nominations for parent & community reps?
- Advertised the AGM & the agenda 14 days prior to the set date?
   Organised or starting to have the Association financial records audited?
- Last years AGM Minutes ready for presentation?
- Written the school association report?
