
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Term 2 Newsletter - 2024

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Committee Matters

One of the core purposes of the school association is to participate in the review of the school's values. As you may have noticed, the new department value set has been rolled out across schools with little to no consultation with the parent members of school associations.

One of our member school associations, Woodbridge School Association, has expressed their anger and disappointment in the apparent breach of section 113 of the Education Act (TAS) 2016.

So what does this mean for your committee?

We recommend a discussion about the values at your next school association committee meeting and a motion be included in your committee minutes to endorse any decisions made.

You have several options to consider:

- 1. Whether you decide to integrate your widely consulted school-specific values with the new DECYP values.
- 2. Or, are you happy to endorse the new DECYP values and discuss how you can align your committee practices to sync with these values.
- 3. Or, do you wish to refuse the new values entirely until broad school consultation takes place.

A meeting motion might read:

MOTION: The [school name] School Association endorse/do not endorse the use of the new DECYP values of connection, courage, growth, respect and responsibility.

MOTION: in addition to the new DECYP values of connection, courage, growth, respect and responsibility the [school name] School Association endorse the embedding of the current school values of [name values] alongside these new values.

TASSO is working with the department to ensure that inclusive and wideranging consultation occurs in the future. Working to ensure there is an increase the value of the parent voice in our students education.

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At any time, if you have an advocacy matter you would like the TASSO Board to consider, please email us. We may invite you to speak to the matter at a Board meeting, held online.





Walk Safety to School Day is Friday May 10

The initiative aims to raise awareness of the health, road safety, transport and environmental benefits that regular walking, or alternative active transport (especially to and from school) can provide for the long term well being of our children, not just on 10 May, but every day. Apart from the physical benefits, regular walking (or similar) also has a favourable impact on children's cognitive and academic performance.

It can serve a good time to assess the environment around your school.

Crossing guards:

The Department of State Growth undertake an assessments of children's crossings to determine if they meet the criteria in the <u>School Traffic Control Facilitates Guidelines</u>. If the criteria is met, State Growth will provide a School Crossing Patrol Officers (SCPO). However, if the criteria is not met, State Growth will work with the local council and school community to implement a number of other safety initiatives. This may include infrastructure (wombat crossings or automatic signage) upgrades or the adoption of the Volunteer SCPO program.
